Dr. Jon Allan, former Helotes Mayor and staunch naturalist, was instrumental in securing state funds that were eventually used to purchase the land for the Sen. Frank, L. Madla, Jr. Natural Area. Dr. Allan was an internationally recognized scientist best known for his work in the 1990s identifying HIV as the causative agent



of AIDS. Dr. Allan passed away in 2009, after a one-year battle with brain cancer.

"BALCONES INVADERS" WILL CONTINUE TO HELP RID PARK OF INVASIVES

"We're back!" Two years ago the Balcones Satellite of the Texas Invaders spent time in the Madla Natural Area and Helotes Creek removing invasive plants. Several weeks ago in late October, we returned to survey the area to assess success (and failure) of our efforts. There has been very little regrowth in the natural area and emergence of a plethora of native plants that were previously suppressed by large Glossy Privet (Ligustrum) and Chinaberry. We were delighted to find Western Soapberry, Texas Walnut, Flameleaf Sumac and a variety of native oak species.

The Texas Invaders (www. Texasinvasives.org) are focused on identification, control and eradication of non-native invasive species, including plants. The primary basis for removal of these invaders is to restore the biological diversity of

the area and allow native species to thrive. Most nonnative invasive species will take over native species if they not controlled. The local satellite, Balcones, was formed in spring of 2010 by three Invaders Citizen Scientists and Alamo Area Master Naturalists who had previous volunteer experience working at eradication efforts at Rancho Diana with the San Antonio Parks and Recreation Department. In August 2010 the group expanded their eradication efforts to Madla Natural Area. Wendy Leonard, former Madla Board member, was instrumental in facilitating this activity.

We plan to continue to work at Madla Park on Tuesday mornings, beginning at 8:30am, throughout December.
